E tū kahikatea Hei whakapae ururoa Awhi mai, awhi atu Tātou, tātou ē

E tū kahikatea Karekau e hinga Awhi mai, awhi atu Tātou, tātou ē

E tū pūriri Toha rā o peka Awhi mai, awhi atu Tātou, tātou ē

Kahikatea, white pine. The koroi or aril from the Kahikatea tree was an important food resource, and served at feasts. The wood was also used for making bird spears and the soot obtained from burning the heartwood was used for tā moko (traditional tattooing).

Puriri found mainly in the upper north island are considered tapu (sacred trees to Māori) used by Māori during tangi (funeral) ceremonies.
