

Ka rere a Matariki, ka wera te hinu – when Matariki rises the fat is heated.

Matariki was associated not only with planting and harvesting, but also with the plentiful supply of game. Often birds would be preserved in their own fat in a gourd. Kererū (wood pigeon), having feasted on native berries, were snared and preserved in fat during Matariki. This practice gave rise to the proverb.
